I was leaving for my studies in Rome, when he said these words to me, and I think he wanted me to be caught up in wonder at the art, architecture, music, and people I would encounter. As I grow older, I continue to learn that Christ is the answer to all the major questions of life. For our part, we want to train minds and hearts to ask the right questions. I pray that we have suc-



ceeded or, at least, helped you along the journey of life.

Finally, during this Jubilee Year, we are "Pilgrims of Hope." We have great hope for the future because of you. Hope does not disappoint because God has poured out his love into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, whom He has given to us. (Romans 5:5).

Ready graduate overcomes medical challenges

Looking at student Sophia Basil, anyone might assume she is a typical 2025 graduate.

Watching her in the halls and class-rooms at Columbus Bishop Ready High School, someone might see a beautiful young lady quietly working on an English essay, or maybe a witty teenager smiling with her friends as they head off to lunch.

Such activities are normal and part of a student's everyday life. For Basil, such events are a blessing that she does not take for granted.

Many might not expect that Basil endured much emotionally, physically and academically. For a time, her family was concerned that she might not complete high school or plan for a career. Nonetheless, Basil beat the odds and rose to the occasion, showing what is possible with hard work and faith in God.

Basil started having seizures in third grade. As years passed, the seizures intensified and drew closer in frequency, which affected her mentally, physically and academically.

When Basil was ready to transition to high school, there were concerns of what day-to-day life might look like and how she would navigate high school with medical needs. Basil needed an individual by her side at all times to assist in case of an emergency.

After what could be considered a rollercoaster of doctor appointments, second opinions and medical testing, Basil was a candidate for brain surgery that could potentially alter her quality of life.

Due to unforeseen circumstances, surgery was delayed multiple times. At the conclusion of her sophomore year, Basil had her much anticipated surgery.

"We all knew that brain surgery was going to come with a lot of risk, but it also gave us hope that it would change my life for the better," she said.

"Everyone at Ready was so supportive and caring throughout the entire process. The day before my surgery, the staff gave me a basket filled with a few of my favorite things, and hats, since I had to shave my head. It was really sweet and very encouraging knowing I had so much support."

A long-term effect of surgery was loss of peripheral and lower vision. It was a risk Basil was willing to take to gain independence and prevent frequent seizures. After considerable hard work, she returned to school, enjoying day-to-day life as a Silver Knight.

"Sophia has come so far," school guidance counselor Jennifer Gramlich

said. "With the support of her parents, she advocated for herself medically and academically. She's been thrown a lot of challenges and each one she has overcome with a smile on her face. I'm so incredibly proud of her and can't wait to see her continue to achieve her goals."

Next school year, Basil plans to attend Columbus State Community College and study to become a patient care assistant (PCA). Her goal is to work at Nationwide Children's Hospital, having been a patient there.

"A lot of times, when you ask someone how they are or how they are feeling, they will tell you 'fine' even though you know deep down they are feeling something different. I want to be able to have my patients know I can relate, and it's OK to say how they really feel," she said.

During the past four years, Basil spent time with Bishop Ready school nurse Jessica Pfeiffer.

"I can absolutely see Sophia as a PCA at Children's one day," Pfeiffer said. "She's compassionate and will do wonderful(ly). As a mom, if I had the ability to pick a PCA for my child in that situation, it would be Sophia."

Son follows in mom's footsteps as Ready valedictorian

The apple didn't fall far from the tree for a Columbus Bishop Ready High School mother-and-son duo.

While most children are eager to forge their own path and flinch at being compared to a parent, this Bishop Ready duo wears similarities like a badge of honor.

Dr. Shannon Roof, née Jenson, graduated from Columbus St. Cecilia School and began classes at Bishop Ready High School in 1991. While attending Bishop Ready, she was heavily involved with the football and basketball cheerleading squads, National Beta Club (an educational youth organization) and National Honor Society. She was also a member of the competitive dance team.

In 1995, Roof was named valedictorian of her class and began classes at the Ohio State University. She studied molecular genetics on a pre-medicine track. Roof quickly discovered a passion for learning and helping others.

She stayed to complete a master's degree in education after earning her undergraduate degree. After two years teaching in a public school, her dream job opened at Bishop Ready High School.

She currently serves as a school science teacher.

"I'll tell anyone that will listen that

I have the best job in the world," she said. "I love being here and I wouldn't trade it for the world. I had a wonderful experience here, and I hope I can provide that feeling and experience for the students in my class. I knew I wanted my own children to be able to experience Bishop Ready like I did."

Thirty years later, in 2021, Tyler, Roof's youngest son, graduated from Columbus Our Lady of Perpetual Help School and began classes at Bishop Ready High School.

While in high school, Tyler was a two-time bowling captain and state qualifier, rotating senior captain of the football team, a student ambassador, member of Beta Club and member of National Honor Society. Much like his mother, he was also named valedictorian of his class and plans to attend Ohio State University to study forensic anthropology on a pre-medicine track.

The mother-son pair share numerous similarities, from a love of science to love for Bishop Ready. Asked what word best describes the Bishop Ready community, they both responded in unison, "family."

Mother and son could be described as driven yet humble. They are known for being intelligent, compassionate, hardworking and faithful servants of

God.

Asked what it was like having a parent

as a teacher, Tyler said, "A lot of people assume that you probably have it easier when, in reality, the expectations were so much greater for me. It gave me an extra push to be at my very best."

Dr. Roof did not take it easy on her three children or three stepchildren, all of whom she taught at Bishop Ready.

"I never wanted people to think they had an unfair advantage," she said. "They all have such different personalities that we had to navigate sharing space together within the school. All six kids worked extremely hard for everything they achieved, and I'm very proud of each of them."

Dr. Roof has had at least one child in the building with her for the past 12 years. She recognized the joy and heartache of seeing her youngest graduate.

"I'm extremely proud, but my heart is definitely feeling the weight of my last child graduating," she said. "I think it'll feel a little sad without him, but I also am so excited to continue to see all my kids grow and achieve their goals."

Asked how it felt to follow in his mother's footsteps to become valedictorian at Bishop Ready and then attend Ohio State University, Tyler said that "it has always been my plan, so it feels really good."

New graduate leaves Bishop Ready with a servant's heart

Columbus Bishop Ready High School graduate Gabriella "Gigi" Racanelli exemplified that service is not simply love and appreciation to others but a demonstration of God's abundant love for all of His people.

Racanelli believes that everyone is called to serve, and service can fill an individual with immense joy, love and fulfillment.

"What Gigi has been able to accomplish is very impressive," principal Matthew Brickner said. "Not only does she find the time to serve others, but she is involved in so many aspects of our school.

"She's the type of student you want to keep forever. It's bittersweet to see her graduate, but we are thankful for the example she has set for future knights, including her two younger siblings, Leo (class of 2027) and Rina (class of 2030)."

During four years at Bishop Ready, Racanelli, a member of the class of 2025, logged more than 700 service hours, with 225 of the hours completed during her senior year.

"Honestly, that 700 seems low. There are so many things Gigi could count for service hours that she doesn't because, to her, service is just something you do.

She doesn't need the glory or recognition of it. She does it simply because she knows it's the right thing to do," said school guidance counselor Jennifer Gramlich, a Ready graduate.

Racanelli was involved in many service opportunities. Asked her favorite organization to volunteer with, she responded, "Miracle League!

"I have the honor of being a buddy to individuals with disabilities as we play baseball together," she continued. "It's really fun and something I look forward to being involved in every Saturday from mid-May through the end of July."

The Racanelli family is known to lead with a servant's heart, especially in their home parish, Columbus St. Margaret of Cortona. Members of the Racanelli family run a section of the parish's weekly fish fry during Lent. Gigi's brother and father lead parish school of religion classes on Sundays, and she lectors during Mass.

"Being able to be of service with my family is a really nice way for us to come together and forget about the grind of everyday life. It allows me to find a calm and centered version of myself. It allows me to refocus my energy," she said.

Once, during a fish fry, she began talking with a family about faith, high school, service and life. The following Monday, the family applied for their eighth grader to attend Bishop Ready the following year.

Asked how they heard about Bishop Ready or why they applied, the family responded that they wanted their children to be like Racanelli, a girl they met at the fish fry on Friday night, and believed Bishop Ready was the environment to foster their academic and spiritual growth.

While attending Bishop Ready, Racanelli also served on student council as executive board president, National Honor Society secretary, Beta Club, a student ambassador, theater, Castle Crew, the St. Vincent de Paul club, a lector at Mass and founder of Book Club.

Racanelli was named the salutatorian for the class of 2025 and plans to attend Walsh University in North Canton, where she received a full tuition scholarship. Racanelli is set to study psychology and was accepted into the university's pre-occupational therapy track, where she plans to earn a master's degree.

"They worked as menial laborers for a couple of years before they advanced into more managerial roles. They were dutiful managers for a regional buffet restaurant. Yet, even in their new positions, they faced difficulties. They were disparaged for being immigrants, and their working hours were unusually long. Nevertheless, they endured, raised two children.

"At the time, I could not understand how profound their troubles were. I was only six years old after all. But once I grew older, and once they confided in me, I could not be prouder. Here were two people, living in a place far from their hometown, managing their working hours to provide for their family and still lovingly raising their children. How could I not be proud?

"So, to repay even the tiniest bit of that

Students consider careers in education after taking classes on teaching

While seniors counted down the days until graduation, for some of them, it might be simply a few years until they're back.

Several students at Columbus St. Francis DeSales High School, located on the north side of Columbus, participated in a class teaching them how to teach. Principal Dan Garrick offered a sequence of education classes to juniors and seniors this past school year.

"We at the high school level offer electives in almost every area that a child may want to go into, but we don't do that for education, and that's our business."

he said. "It would seem to me that it would be very logical."

The idea was also a response to a growing teacher shortage. Fewer young adults today appear to be interested in becoming teachers. As a result, Garrick set out to grow his own.

"We have fertile soil in our schools, kids that may be interested in education," he said. "What better way of encouraging them to go into education and then ultimately come back to their alma maters, whether it's a grade school or a high school, and consider making it a career within our diocese."

The first such class offered to students at St. Francis DeSales is known as Exploring Education, and the second, Foundations in Teaching. Garrick first

offered the Exploring Education class last school year during the spring 2024 semester.

The first class in the sequence focused on providing students an overview of opportunities in education.

"The large focus is clearly on teaching but also making sure kids understood other areas that you could be involved in when it comes to teaching, whether you want to be a guidance counselor or an intervention specialist, or you want to perhaps be some type of support, like an athletic director, or you want to go into school administration. We looked at all the various roles that you could theoretically play within a school setting," Garrick said.

Students observed teachers at the el-

ementary and high school level. They visited schools in the area and observed teachers at St. Francis DeSales who they were not taught by in class. Students reflected on effective teaching methods.

"In addition to being exposed to different roles, we talked about different types of educational settings that a student may want to look at and really a strong focus on Catholic education as well: the value, the advantages of a faith-based education," Garrick said.

The class proved to be a success, and students asked for continued instruction on education. Garrick designed the second class, Foundations in Teaching, in response and to "get into the more

nuanced parts of teaching," he said. The class was offered to juniors and seniors this past spring semester.

A few students who took the class are interested in studying education in college. Should they want to return to St. Francis DeSales, they will be well prepared. The class equipped students to return and teach in a diocesan Catholic school after earning their college degree.

Dillon Govekar, a senior at DeSales, had considered studying education for a while. He was intrigued when he heard a class would be offered on the subject.

"I thought it would have been best to experience it before I dedicated four years to it," he explained.

"I was iffy on it until ... this year, but then, as it went on, I realized this is what I want to do. ... I'm really happy I did take this type of class."

The recent high-school graduate will head to John Carroll University in Cleveland this fall to play soccer and study education. He plans to return to a high school setting one day as a history teacher.

Foundations in Teaching offered practical teaching tips, which, Govekar explained, he can implement in a classroom as a teacher. He found it helpful that Garrick also shared his teaching expertise with the class.

"He gave personal experiences he's had when he taught, because he did

teach history, too. He tries to tie that in to what we're learning about," Govekar explained.

His desire to be a high school history teacher was largely inspired by his sophomore history teacher at St. Francis DeSales, Nick Slupski.

"He inspired me to want to pursue the path altogether," Govekar said. "I feel like if I follow in his footsteps – I learned a lot from his class – I feel like that would benefit me."

Students who took Foundations in Teaching studied a variety of education-related topics. They learned about differentiated instruction, testing and different methods of teaching.

During one class period, Garrick instructed students on special populations, including special needs and gifted individuals. The students learned common characteristics of gifted students, average intelligence quotient (IQ) and a gifted IQ. They learned about various types of gifted students and how to identify and assist them.

Students in the class continued teaching observations at elementary schools and St. Francis DeSales. Each student also taught the class on a topic of choice.

Juniors Abbie Canter and Aedan Pallone, who took Foundations in Teaching this past semester, are interested in pursuing a career in education. Both took the class to learn more.

"It wasn't exactly what I expected," Canter said. "I think that it ended up being better because we go on observations and look at different schools, which, I think, is so much more hands on than always sitting, lecturing."

Students in the class observed teachers in classrooms at Columbus St. Josephine Bakhita, Our Lady of Peace and Immaculate Conception schools as well

Giles noted that Ruiz served as the primary campus guide for a fellow senior who is completely visually impaired. Ruiz waited for his peer after every period, regardless if they were in the same class, and took him to his next class.

"For that opportunity, I am so in-

credibly grateful," Ruiz said. "Although we began as simply fellow classmates, throughout sophomore year and especially through junior and senior year, he has grown to be one of my closest friends. In fact, I would go as far as to say he is the friend I talk to the most in school. Whether it is about our homework, class schedules or just mundane topics, we talk(ed) to each other every day for the past three years."

Ruiz also tutored, mentored and assisted several students during his years at St. Charles.

"I strove to help others whenever they were struggling in a subject," he said.

"I remember this year especially I tutored a junior who was struggling in honors chemistry. After being asked by Mr. (Ryan) Mickle to help him, I gladly gave him my time. We set up shared times where he could come to me with any questions, either in chemistry or Algebra II.'

Ruiz served as a mentor for the school's My Brother's Keeper mentoring group and as vice president of outreach. In the program, St. Charles students go into the community and tutor local students in an elementary school. Ruiz's mentee is now a freshman at St. Charles Preparatory School.

Ruiz mentored and tutored several St. Charles underclassmen, advising them on how to better prepare for exams, expectations for later years at St. Charles and how to mentally prepare for the rigorous schooling that St. Charles challenges its upperclassmen.

For the past year, Ruiz served on the Columbus Holy Spirit Church parish council - its youngest member - in addition to involvement in several community service projects at St. Charles.

Ruiz has a passion for writing. He served as editor-in-chief for the school's newspaper, The Carolian, and an editor for the school's yearbook, The Spectrum, for four years.

Ruiz, a member of the school's Borromean Chapter of the National Honor Society, excelled in the classroom as well. He held a 4.33 grade point average, scored magna cum laude on the National Latin Exam his sophomore

as other schools in the area.

Pallone said she appreciated the opportunity to take trips, see students in a classroom and observe. She explained that a hands-on class is how she learns best. Pallone also benefited from the instruction on different learning styles.

"It just teaches you that not every kid learns the same way and just how to accommodate to each student in their own needs, in their plan, their own goals," she said.

"I think that the most important thing I learned is listening to your students and making sure that you're seeing them where they're at, and that there's more going on than just school, which is really important to build those relationships

with students," Canter added.

Garrick found that he appreciated teaching the class as much as students enjoyed learning.

"I thoroughly enjoy it," he said. "It's great for me. I think it's also good for the kids, too, to see their principal as a teacher because you don't necessarily always see your principal as a teacher, although most principals obviously started as teachers."

Garrick reported 30 students are signed up for Exploring Education next year. He will likely offer the class in the fall and spring semesters, he said. He also anticipates offering Foundations in Teaching again during spring semester next school year.







